
# 'What you think of Durham City Centre - now and in the future?

Young people's views on Durham City
With thanks to pupils from
St. Margaret's C of E Primary School, St. Oswald's C of E Aided Primary & Nursery School,
St. Leonard's Catholic School and Durham Sixth Form Centre

As part of the process of public consultation to inform the Durham City Centre Neighbourhood Plan, we have sought the views of children and young people who study at primary and secondary schools in the Neighbourhood Plan area: St. Margaret's C of E Primary School, St. Oswald's C of E Aided Primary & Nursery School, St. Leonard's Catholic School, and Durham Sixth Form Centre.

Over a period of 5 months (October 2015 – March 2016) meetings were held with members of each school's council, which represents the pupil body from each year group. A total of 70 children and young people of both genders, aged between 5 - 18 years took part.

Thank you to all the pupils who took part and particularly to Mrs G. Harrison, St. Oswald's Primary School; Mrs H. McDaid, St. Margaret's Primary School; Mr D Murray, Susan Mitchell & Sarah Baillie, St. Leonard's Catholic School; Hannah Haygarth and Mr Robinson, Durham Sixth Form Centre.

### Questions and visuals shown

The pupils were asked to answer the same three open-ended questions, accompanied by photos<sup>1</sup> of Durham City, which had been asked of adults at the Open Meetings in Durham Town Hall in June & July 2015,

What is good about Durham City? What is bad about Durham City? What do you think needs to change?

The groups were given space to discuss the questions, and to write or draw their ideas<sup>2</sup>. At the end of each meeting the pupils were asked to feedback to the whole group and discuss their viewpoints.

This report is a resume of their responses and the themes and priorities, which emerged from the meetings.

The themes were

- 1. Environment and heritage
- 2. Community
- 3. Infrastructure
- 4. Housing
- 5. Leisure
- 6. Retail

Through discussion the pupils identified the following issues as the main priorities:

- Traffic and road safety
- Bus station & public transport
- Environment & streetscape
- Leisure including Retail, Heritage & the River

### Traffic and road safety, bus station and public transport

Traffic, parking and public transport emerged as the main priority for young people of all ages, although each age group were concerned with different issues. Each group raised safety concerns, which they would like to see addressed; the flow of traffic, the interaction between pedestrian and cars, overcrowded pavements, traffic jams and pollution, and car parking preoccupied the younger age group. Whereas the older age group, who are regular users of public transport, were most concerned about the state of the bus station and the buses, and the social problems associated with using these, in some instances the pupils had witnessed drug exchanges at the bus station. They also objected to people smoking whilst waiting for buses, the lack of a safe waiting area and the disorganized queuing system.

Some of their suggestions for addressing these issues and improving safety:

### Road safety & parking

- Faster traffic lights
- Wider pavements
- More pedestrian crossings
- Cycle tracks so cyclists don't have to ride on the pavements or roads
- More parking
- Increase park and ride spaces and opening hours

### Buses and Bus station

- Improve the bus station by providing a waiting area, creating a safe queuing system and installing better lighting
- Use bigger buses at peak times
- Cheaper bus fares

### **Environment & Streetscape**

All pupils were aware of the condition of the city environment particularly issues relating to litter, smoking in public, and the state of North Road, the latter was raised by every age group. Their concerns ranged from pavement hazards for pedestrians, such as shop signs cluttering the pavements and uneven paving stones, to feeling intimidated by crowds, hawkers, beggars and drunks.

To address these issues they have suggested:

- Improve the streetscape of North Road, particularly shop fronts
- Use hanging shops signs
- More litter bins, designed to blend into the streetscape
- Ban smoking in the city
- More visible police and security, particularly at the bus station

### Leisure, Retail, Heritage and River

The young people all had a strong appreciation of the heritage and architecture of the city and a discernible pride in the historic centre, particularly the cathedral and castle. They all enjoyed the river and the river walks, and felt that even more could be made of the riverbanks to improve access and leisure opportunities.

On the whole the young people thought the retail experience in the city centre was good, although there was a desire for more specialist shops, which, depending on age, varied between more sweet shops and better clothing shops!

They all enjoyed the events staged in the city, particularly Lumiere, which was praised, as were the specialist markets. However, the young people felt that entertainment on the whole was more 'focused towards adults' and young children, rather than teenagers.

The following are their suggestions to improve the retail and leisure offer in Durham:

- Enhance the heritage assets to attract more visitors
- Improve the existing parks, and add more parks
- Keep the riverbanks clean, make them more accessible and promote nature
- More open air city centre events eg. An activity week like the one in Chester-le-Street, and an open air cinema in the summer
- Indoor activities such as a climbing wall and a bowling alley
- An indoor space where teenagers can meet so they don't have to use coffee shops
- A shoppers crèche -somewhere to leave children where they can be entertained whilst parents shop
- Shops more attractive to teenagers so they don't have to visit the Metro Centre

Two additional issues, **Housing** and **Employment**, were raised which were of particularly concern to a minority group of respondents.

**Housing** was a negative issue for pupils from three of the schools (St. Margaret's, St. Oswald's and St. Leonard's) where many of the pupils are resident in the City centre. Their comments echoed those of the adults from the public consultation and referred to noise from neighbours, too many resident students and the issue of building houses on green spaces, which they disagreed with. Their suggestions for improving the housing supply in the city included re-using derelict buildings as homes, building more affordable homes and returning student housing to houses for families.

The pupils from St. Leonard's and Durham Sixth Form Centre, where some respondents were school leavers, were concerned by the lack of **employment** opportunities in Durham City. They also felt that the choice of jobs in the City is limited. They would like a wider choice of permanent jobs to choose from and more part-time jobs to be made available to young people, particularly in the proposed new entertainment venues in the City.

### Conclusion

All respondents had a positive appreciation of Durham City, its heritage, environment, and community, which is evidenced by their comments, and on the whole they thought the City was a good place to live.

Durham County Council has addressed a number of the issues raised during the consultation; for example the redevelopment of Wharton Park and the installation of Scoot traffic lights to help the flow of traffic through the city. The emerging *Durham City Sustainable Transport Strategy* is an indicator of the Council's intention to improve pedestrian and cycling in the City, although this is still a work in progress. However, other issues the respondents raised such as the state of the bus station, North Road, crowded pavements, road safety, leisure and employment will help to inform the Durham City Centre Neighbourhood Plan, which along with the County Durham Plan will shape the future regeneration and development of Durham City, and enhance the life opportunities for young people in Durham City




